Siemens Mobility is giving \$15,000 donations to Dare to Care Food Bank in Louisville and Crittenden County Food Bank in Marion to support the friends, local heroes and communities where its employees live and work.

More than 200 employees work for Siemens Mobility in Louisville, and more than 150 in Marion. These facilities engineer and manufacture important automation, crossing and signaling technology for some of the busiest railroad networks in North American market.

“Siemens has stepped up to help save lives,” Gov. Beshear said. “In addition to supporting health care needs and critical local government services across the country, the company is helping Team Kentucky get through this crisis by investing in our food banks when they need it most.”

Siemens Mobility efforts complement Siemens’ and Siemens Healthineers’ collective efforts to combat COVID-19 in the U.S. by supporting critical infrastructure and by helping state and local governments address urgent healthcare needs. The company’s employees are maintaining essential operations to support hospitals, power plants, government facilities, military sites, manufacturing locations and data centers. They’re also supporting critical city services such as transportation, water and waste, and national security emergency response systems. Additionally, Siemens Foundation announced it is providing \$1.5 million to community health centers for COVID-19 response efforts.
